Darwin Days

On February 17th, Dave & Debbie Elftman, Mary Nettesheim, John Rettler, and Mike Andrysczyk, represented the KMGS with some display tables at the Darwin Days at the Thomas A. Greene Museum in Lapham Hall at UWM.

Thomas A. Greene, an amateur geologist that lived in Milwaukee in the late 1800's, and the Geological Museum which bears his namesake, contains the fossil and mineral collection of what at his death was considered the world's greatest collection west of Philadelphia.

The Greene Museum is an honorary home for some magnificent specimens which includes exquisite examples of amethyst, apatite, stibnite, copper, tungsten, molybdenum, vanadium, cobalt, nickel, mercury compounds, aluminum compounds, malachite, lapis-lazuli, tourmaline, garnet, labradorite, fluorite, beryl, and turquoise, among others.

Perhaps the highlight of the mineral collection is a piece of iron meteorite that landed in nearby Washington County, Wisconsin. It was given to Greene by the scientist Increase A. Lapham, Wisconsin's first Geologist, the namesake of Lapham Hall.

The KMGS members welcomed 360 quests ranging from students to families with young children, who came by people come and stopped to view the displays, ask questions about the KMGS and what we do, and take a show flyer with them, along with a few samples to start their own collections.

The daylong event was a fun excursion and a successful means to have the public learn about geology and the

AMERICAN FEDERATION OF MINERALOGICAL SOCIETIES CODE OF ETHICS FOR ROCK COLLECTING

I will respect both public and private property and will do no collecting on privately owed land without permission from the owner. Type to enter text

I will keep informed on all laws, regulations or rules governing collecting on public lands and will observe them.

I will, to the best of my ability, ascertain the boundary lines of the property on which I plan to collect.

I will use no firearms or blasting materials in collecting areas.

I will cause no willful damage to property of any kind such as fences, signs, buildings, etc.

I will leave all gates as found.

I will build fires only in designated or safe places and will be certain they are completely extinguished before leaving the area.

I will discard no burning material – matches, cigarettes, etc.

I will fill all excavation holes that may be dangerous to livestock.

I will not contaminate wells, creeks, or other water supplies.

I will cause no willful damage to collecting material and will take home only what I can reasonably use.

I will practice conservation and undertake to use fully and well the materials I have collected and will recycle my surplus for the pleasure and benefit of others.

I will report to my club or Federation officers, Bureau of Land Management or other authorities, any deposit of petrified wood or other materials on public lands which should be protected for the enjoyment of future generations for public educational and scientific purposes.

I will appreciate and protect our heritage of natural resources.

I will observe the "Golden Rule", will use Good Outdoor Manners and will, at all times, conduct myself in a manner which will add to the stature and Public Image of rockhounds everywhere.
